Have you heard of the umbrella term, bi+?

This word represents the majority of the LGBTQ+ community: those who identify as bisexual, pansexual, fluid, queer, or any other label that recognizes people who experience attraction to more than one gender.

You may have heard of the many harmful stereotypes that bi+ people have to endure. For example, because they experience feelings for more than one gender, lots of people think they are **disloyal partners** if they choose to be in a romantic or sexual monogamous relationship. But in reality, their sexual orientation doesn't make them more likely to cheat. Bi+ people are also often told that their identity is **just a phase**, something they will grow out of. Everyone has their own journey, but it doesn't negate the validity and fluidity of bi+ people. Additionally, people who identify both as bi+ and as a woman are often **hypersexualized** by men in our society. This is hurtful because it makes it seem like their identity is not their own, but instead for others to objectify.

It's so important to have conversations that bring to light the beauty in the way bi+ people challenge the binaries of gay and straight, man and woman, especially during **Bisexual Health Awareness Month**, which is celebrated in March!

Because of everything they're up against, bi+ people are more likely to suffer mentally, physically, and socially than their gay, lesbian, or heterosexual counterparts.

March 20th, the first day of spring, is **National Native HIV/AIDS Awareness Day**, which aims to educate indigenous communities on HIV testing and resources. Historically, marginalized communities have disproportionately suffered from HIV/AIDS, like the indigenous, working class, and queer populations.

- Feeling overwhelmed? Google "alternate nostril breathing," and learn about this breathing technique proven to lower anxiety and strengthen overall health.
- Sometimes, when we're struggling, it's hard to keep a clean space. Maybe, in the spirit of spring cleaning, it's time to tackle this. For example, try decluttering one drawer a day!
- 3. "Don't give up" is a quote we hear constantly. But sometimes, taking a beat and walking away from something is the right thing. Next time you feel frustrated or hopeless, try pausing to pet an animal, make a snack, or take a shower.

BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS



Note for parents: Chapter books are great choices for youth. Usually aimed for ages 7-10, kids younger than or older than this range can still enjoy them, so it depends if that individual book is right for you or your child. Young adult (YA) books are usually aimed for ages 12-18, but again, due to the various amount of subject matter, it shifts by book, some being more mature than others. Adults can also enjoy YA books!

This Is Our Rainbow: 16 Stories of Her, Him, Them, and Us Edited by Katherine Locke and Nicole Melleby (Youth/Best for ages 8-12)

The first LGBTQIA+ anthology for middle-graders featuring stories for every letter of the acronym, including realistic, fantasy, and sci-fi stories by authors like Justina Ireland, Marieke Nijkamp, Alex Gino, and more!

A boyband fandom becomes a conduit to coming out. A former bully becomes a first-kiss prospect. One nonbinary kid searches for an inclusive athletic community after quitting gymnastics. Another nonbinary kid, who happens to be a pirate, makes a wish that comes true-but not how they thought it would. A tween girl navigates a crush on her friend's mom. A young witch turns herself into a puppy to win over a new neighbor. A trans girl empowers her online bestie to come out.

From wind-breathing dragons to first crushes, This Is Our Rainbow features story after story of joyful, proud LGBTQIA+ representation. You will fall in love with this insightful, poignant anthology of queer fantasy, historical, and contemporary stories from authors including: Eric Bell, Lisa Jenn Bigelow, Ashley Herring Blake, Lisa Bunker, Alex Gino, Justina Ireland, Shing Yin Khor, Katherine Locke, Mariama J. 
Heartstopper


