

May 17th was originally chosen as the date for this holiday "to commemorate the World Health Organization's decision in 1990 to declassify homosexuality as a mental disorder." TIPS FROM YOUR ADVOCATES

Peruse these tips from your Kaleidoscope Advocates centered on self-care!





- 1. As the weather gets warmer, **spend a little more intentional time outside** if you can, enjoying how the grass feels under your toes, how the birds sound, or how the sun feels on your face. This is so good for our mental health!
- 2. Next month is Pride Month! In celebration of your identity, plan to do something with friends, family, or yourself, whatever is safest for you. This can be anything from attending a pride parade, to making a homemade dinner, to journaling about what you love about yourself.
- 3. **Do something small every day that makes life feel a little more special.** You can cut up some fresh fruit to add to your water, listen to music while you complete a task, or anything else that brings you joy.

It can be hard to love yourself in a world that tells you that you shouldn't exist. But know that your Kaleidoscope Advocates have your back and are here to remind you how special and worthy you are!



BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS



Note for parents: Chapter books are great choices for youth. Usually aimed for ages 7-10, kids younger than or older than this range can still enjoy them, so it depends if that individual book is right for you or your child. Young adult (YA) books are usually aimed for ages 12-18, but again, due to the various amount of subject matter, it shifts by book, some being more mature than others. Adults can also enjoy YA books!


Hazel's Theory of Evolution

Hazel knows a lot about the world. That's because when she's not hanging with her best friend, taking care of her dog, or helping care for the goats on her family's farm, she loves reading through dusty encyclopedias.

But even Hazel doesn't have answers for the questions awaiting her as she enters eighth grade. What if no one at her new school gets her, and she doesn't make any friends? What's going to happen to one of her moms, who's pregnant again after having two miscarriages? Why does everything have to change when life was already perfectly fine?

As Hazel struggles to cope, she'll come to realize that sometimes you have to look within yourself--instead of the pages of a book--to find the answer to life's most important questions.

Award-winning author and artist Mike Curato draws on his own experiences in *Flamer*, his debut graphic novel, telling a difficult story with humor, compassion, and love.

I know I'm not gay. Gay boys like other boys. I hate boys. They're mean, and scary, and they're always destroying something or saying something dumb or both.

I hate that word. Gay. It makes me feel . . . unsafe.

It's the summer between middle school and high school, and Aiden Navarro is away at camp. Everyone's going through changes—but for Aiden, the stakes feel higher. As he navigates friendships, deals with bullies, and spends time with Elias (a boy he can't stop thinking about), he finds himself on a path of self-discovery and acceptance.
