A set of <u>behaviors</u>, <u>beliefs</u> and <u>values</u> characteristic of a particular social, ethnic or age group **TRANSMITTED** from one <u>generation</u> to another.

## **Working Definition**

### Resilience

*"achieving desirable outcomes in spite of significant CHALLENGES to adaptation or development"*

## Three Types:

<u>**Overcoming the odds**</u> = attainment of positive outcomes despite high-risk status;

<u>**Recovery from trauma**</u> = children who function well after an intensely stressful or traumatic event(s);

<u>Sustained competence under stress</u> = ability to cope with chronic environmental stress factors;



For children and youth to develop into healthy, confident, and secure individuals actively engaged in their personal and social growth they must be viewed <u>"AT PROMISE"</u> as opposed to <u>"AT RISK"</u>

## **Characteristics:**

□ Being in poverty for **TWO GENERATIONS** 

□ Systemic discrepancies

Children are socialized into <u>BEHAVIORS</u> and <u>ATTITUDES</u> leading to an inability to escape poverty

## **School Impact:**

- □ Failure to complete assignments
- Physically aggressive
- Likes to entertain
- Very disorganized, frequently lose papers, no signatures

#### It is Important to Understand that...

An **EDUCATION** is the key to getting out of, and staying out of, generational poverty



## **Breaking The Cycle:**

- 1. Equitable distribution of resources.
- 2. Improve skills of disadvantaged children & youth
- 3. Develop authentic relationships
- 4. Empathetic engagement

# **Perceptions/Stereotypes:** Getting off Automatic!

**Perceptions:** The process by which we try and **INTERPRET** information about the environment/people around us.

**Stereotypes:** An **EXAGERRATED BELIEFS** associated with a general group or groups to which a person belongs.
